Support Youth to Become Empowered Adults

LMM understands the complex challenges many youth across Cuyahoga County face and is committed to offering a safe place of respite and revitalization for youth facing adversity and housing insecurity. LMM's Youth Resiliency Services (YRS) program takes a holistic approach to meeting the basic needs of youth facing homelessness, providing critical shelter and independent living services through a trauma-informed lens, alongside behavioral health, physical health and case management services.

According to an article from Signal Cleveland, 'How often do 18- to 24-year-olds experience homelessness in Cleveland?', it's estimated that 10% of Cuyahoga County's homeless shelters fall into the 18- to 24-year-old age group. This article also cites a University of Maryland School of Social Work study stating that 32% of youth in Cuyahoga County foster care identify as LGBTQ+.

Inform Systems Change with Us

Putting boots on the ground and empowering program participants each and every day is at the core of LMM's mission. Through our four program areas, LMM is able to uplift the people we serve and support them through the day-to-day barriers they face in securing housing, finding employment, navigating difficult legal guardianship situations and more. While it's critical that we provide direct service on the ground, LMM also recognizes the need to address the root causes of the issues that plague the people we serve, including racism, discrimination and systemic inequities.

LMM's Office of Advocacy informs systems change at the local, state and federal levels by leveraging the expertise of staff and the experiences of program participants to advocate on behalf of those who are hurting to be empowered, valued and healed. Advancing racial equity, ending homelessness and reforming the criminal legal system are guiding principles in carrying out our advocacy work. LMM is able to carry out these principles through building relationships with elected officials, educating them on our mission and working with them to influence public policy to best support the people we serve.

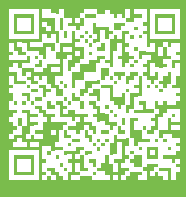
Solar-Efficient Housing: Amplifying Our Impact

At LMM, we believe that housing is a human right, and we continually think outside of the box to create innovative solutions that empower the people we serve.

Through our solar-powered housing initiative, in partnership with Westlake-based housing enterprise PadSmart, LMM is transforming empty parcels on the east side of Cleveland into affordable, energy efficient homes for unhoused individuals in our city to rebuild their lives. The units are energy positive, producing at least as much energy as they consume, and will cost around \$425 per month, roughly one-third of the price of fair market rent rates in the area.

While the solar-powered housing units are currently being built at PadSmart, LMM is still finding ways to amplify our impact throughout the process. Pasha, a resident at the LMM-operated Men's Shelter on Lakeside Ave., was able to secure a job at PadSmart to assist with building homes for the solar-powered housing initiative. According to Nolan White, Men's Shelter Substance Use Disorder Coordinator, Pasha "saw in him a determination to get on with his life." Nolan added that "Pasha also regularly shares with me his progress: He is still working for PadSmart and also works for Area Temps. He opened a bank account and shared that he is saving to move into his own place."

LMM believes that past experiences should not dictate outcomes in housing and employment, and Pasha's story is a living example of that.

Guardianship Services 35th Anniversary Year

As this year comes to a close, LMM would like to thank you all for celebrating 35 years of advocacy, care and hope through Guardianship Services with us! Formed in 1989, LMM's Guardianship Services program provides critical care throughout Cuyahoga and Lorain counties as legal guardians to serve as concerned, caring advocates and surrogate decision-makers for indigent, incompetent adults who cannot care for themselves and have often encountered abuse or exploitation. Here's to 35 more years of life-changing service!

According to the Prison Policy Initiative, an estimated 71,000 Ohio residents are currently serving time in prisons and jails, which reflects Ohio's incarceration rate of about 621 per 100,000 people. This is a rate that has grown dramatically over the past 40 years and is higher than the nation's average.

Additionally, a 2021 report from the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation & Correction states that Ohio's recidivism rate is over 32%, meaning many individuals that were formerly incarcerated ended up re-offending. Between the challenges of collateral sanctions, finding stable, fair-wage employment, securing safe, affordable housing, reuniting with family and more after being released, a significant number of individuals will end up back behind bars.

This begs the question: **What can be done to support returning citizens and lower Ohio's recidivism rate?**

At LMM, we believe that if we provide individuals who are currently or were once incarcerated with the resources and skills that they need to succeed, these individuals will have a smaller chance of recidivism. After nearly a decade of operating the Chopping for Change culinary program serving currently incarcerated individuals — a program that boasts a recidivism rate of less than 3% — LMM is excited to expand our vocational training offerings with the launch of the Building Maintenance & Repair (BMR) program in early 2025. With a focus on light construction, building maintenance, home repair and remodeling, this program offers a high potential opportunity to change the trajectory of individuals with barriers to employment, quality of life, and upward mobility. Not only will workforce training be offered, but the BMR program will also include career and job readiness services, preparing students to feel empowered in securing employment.

A PLACE Meant at moCa Cleveland

How can Cleveland use emerging design solutions to address displacement and affordable housing challenges in our city?

Co-organized by LMM, the Cleveland Museum of Contemporary Art (moCa) and Founding Principal of I_You Design Lab, Sai Sinbondit, the A PLACE Meant art exhibit explores the potential for Cleveland to bring an end to homelessness by embracing bold innovations in housing development. The exhibit uniquely ties together inventive strategies and concepts like 3D printing, mushroom and clothing bricks, and solar power for energy efficiency, while reflecting and sharing data on Cleveland's housing history to encourage shifts that could make the city a center of design innovation in the future.
